

Chaucer's Vocabulary Challenge!

We love learning new words here at The Armarium Press – and so do the kids who "test" our Chaucer worksheets! After we helped them look up the words *coy* and *roil* during this exercise, they came up with the illustrative examples.

coy – adjective. Pretending to be shy. Some dogs may seem shy when you meet them. If the dog is a terrier, though, he's probably just coy – pretending to be sweet and quiet so you won't be prepared when he jumps up and snarfs your sandwich.

roil – verb. To stir up a liquid that has dirt at the bottom and make it cloudy. When those dogs jumped into the pond, the water roiled with the mud from the bottom.
