Read the word and then add the letter "e." Write and pronounce the new word.



Chaucer's Vocabulary Challenge!

We love learning new words here at The Armarium Press – and so do the kids who "test" our Chaucer worksheets! *Rune*, *gale*, and *pip* were the three that had them handing us the dictionary for a definition during this "silent e" exercise.

rune – noun. A letter in an ancient alphabet that looks different from our ABCs; also, a mysterious poem. Chaucer prefers writing sonnets to writing runes.

gale – noun. A strong wind. Chaucer's fur flies everywhere when he's caught in a storm gale.

pip – noun. The small seed of a fruit such as an apple. When Chaucer bakes an apple pie for his friends, he makes sure to remove all the pips.
